Being a Gatekeeper...

by Judi Sweeney When Pastor Joe first shared our monthly verse ("For a day in your courts is better than a thousand elsewhere. I would rather be a doorkeeper in the house of my God." Psalm 84:10), I found myself drawn to the word "gatekeeper." Different versions of the Bible substitute the word "doorkeeper" for "gatekeeper," and that idea brought back to my memory several instances of my own door or gatekeeping.

As the oldest sibling, I felt it was my duty and privilege to answer the door when someone knocked. At the sound of a knock or later, the doorbell, I would fly to the door trying to beat my mother or father. There were a lot of door knockers when I was a child. The milkman and ice man (we had an original ice box for storing our cold needing food) knocked at the backdoor almost daily. I loved opening the door to these kind men who knew my name and greeted me like I was a grown-up, but they always waited until my mother or father appeared before they would come into the kitchen with their goods.

As I grew older, I actually started opening the front door. That was more exciting to me then, but I didn't recognize the danger at all for quite a while. People came to the door to sell cosmetics, encyclopedias, brushes, and much more. One day my mother was busy with my younger sister, and I heard the knock. "I got it," I yelled to my mother. I opened the door, then opened the screen door. "Come in," I said politely. I had never seen the man before, and I had never invited someone in before. I tried to do it as my mother had let salesmen come into our home. My mother came around the corner and stopped in her tracks to see a stranger already in the house. I don't remember what he was selling, but my mother sent him on his way quite quickly. Any person who would come into a home on a child's word was never going to get her business. I then got a very serious lecture about how dangerous it was to let people you didn't know into the house. That lesson stuck with me.

My Ministry...

by Bridget Reynolds I was excited when Judi asked me write an article for the newsletter "My Ministry." I believe every believer is called into ministry even when we work in a secular job.

I've worked as a professional driver for the last 8 years. My first job was driving special needs students to school at Van Pool. I got to know the students and their families well. Some had younger children caring for their older disabled siblings. Some were facing temporary homelessness. I drove all over Massachusetts in rich neighborhoods and public housing communities. I discovered community is so important because no one can handle everything alone. During my time at Van Pool, I drove an 8 year old boy who lost his Mom to a drug overdose and his Dad was serving time for drug related offenses and theft. This boy lived in public housing with his grandfather and was active in speaking out about drugs and crime, a lifestyle that never pays off. The Story of Elijah...

Following God's Instructions...by Karen McGrail We started with prayer and a short video. The story was from 2 Kings 5. After taking Elijah up to heaven, God raised a new prophet named Elisha to speak God's message and show God's power. Naaman was a commander in the Syrian army who stole an Israelite girl. This girl, instead of being bitter, helped Naaman. He had leprosy and the girl told him about the prophet Elisha and her God who could heal him. So, Namaan met Elisha who told him to dip in the Jordan River 7 times. Naaman was at first too proud to do this, but eventually he did it and was healed. Elisha did not want any payment for this because he said it was God's grace, but his servant went back to Naaman and accepted the money. He then lied to Elisha regarding taking the money, and so God punished him with leprosy. His servant learned

the difficult way that there are some gifts money can't buy -- especially GRACE (God's Riches at Christ's Expense). The lesson was teaching us how important it is to obey God even if He asks you to do something that may seem strange. We then created tissue paper crosses that looked like stained glass as well as mosaic crosses to remind us of God's grace. We ended with several Bible trivia questions.

Gatekeepers in the Bible

Remembering about these kinds of incidents made me want to understand what door or gatekeepers were all about in the Bible. The first gatekeeper was an angel. In Genesis 3:24 we read God's instructions to a cherubim who was to keep Adam and Eve from ever re-entering the Garden of Eden, "*He drove out the man, and at the east* of the garden of Eden He placed the cherubim and a flaming sword that turned every way to guard the way to the tree of life." So, from the very beginning, God's gatekeepers were supposed to keep sin out.

By the time of Moses and the Exodus to the Promised Land, God had established gatekeepers. God called His people to be in fellowship with Him, but there were restrictions to this. Sin was not to enter into the place where God fellowshipped with his people. Gatekeepers kept out those who would try to sin within this special place. Once in the Promised Land, one grandson of Aaron (Moses' brother) put a man named Phinehas in charge of the gatekeepers of the Tabernacle. They guarded the entrance to the Tabernacle tent day and night, keeping the unrighteous from coming into the place where God dwelled and opening the door each morning so that people could bring their sacrifices and offerings to the priests.

Samuel became a gatekeeper himself. In 1 Samuel 3:15 we read, *"Samuel lay until morning: then he opened the doors of the house of the LORD."* Samuel, only a young boy at this point, was given the job of gatekeeper – locking up the doors in the evening and opening them in the morning. He did what Eli's sons couldn't do because of their evil nature.

Later, Solomon, son of David, finished the work of his father by building the first temple. David had appointed 4,000 Levites (the gatekeepers' tribe) to guard the gates of the temple day and night, and 4,000 more were appointed to praise God with musical instruments. (1 Chronicles 23:5). These men were divided into divisions headed by Levi's sons -- Gershon, Kohath, and Merari. The family of Kohath was specially designated by David to be both gatekeepers and musicians of praise. The original member of the family, Korah, had been part of a rebellion of the people in the Wilderness against Moses and God. Korah and others had wanted anybody to be able to come into the area of worship and offer sacrifices without the questioning of the gatekeepers. There would be no one gatekeeping, keeping unrighteous and evil people away from this special place of God. The Lord would not accept this, and He sent down fire on Korah and 250 of those who felt the same way he did. Korah died, but his sons carried on and became faithful gatekeepers. (Note that Psalm 84 was a song the sons sang.)

When the Kings of Israel were evil, people who shouldn't have been let in came into the temple and performed all kinds of evil sin with impunity. The gatekeepers themselves committed some these sins. When the Kings of Israel were righteous, the gatekeepers did their jobs – they guarded the gates and worshipped God through music.

But the people of Israel, even the religious leaders, always slipped back into their sinful ways. Then one day, Jesus appeared in Jerusalem in the final week of his life. He went into the temple and drove out all of the merchants and moneychangers. He cleansed the temple, fulfilling what gatekeepers should do once and for always.

Personal Gatekeeping

So, how does this apply to us personally? The idea of gatekeeping can apply to the church and the people within it. It also, though, can apply to each believer. The Bible tells us that our bodies as believers are temples for the Holy Spirit (*"Or do you not know that your body is a temple of the Holy Spirit within you, whom you have from God?,"* 1 Corinthians 6:19). We need to be gatekeepers of our hearts, minds and souls. We are to shut the door on unholy influences, sin, and temptations that keep us from following the urging of the Spirit. We need to open the door when the light shines and bring in all that God offers us to fulfill His purpose for our lives and for the Kingdom. It truly is better to be a gatekeeper in the house of my God!

program in the housing community working to keep drugs out of their community. At 8 years old he tutored younger kids, and even mentored teenagers who had already turned to drugs, pleading with them to give it up before they suffered the consequences. I was one of his biggest cheerleaders.

I had a pre-school student who needed walking aides, and additional support inside the car seat to help her sit safely. I learned how to use her adaptive equipment to get her safely into and out of the van even though it was her parents' responsibility. After a year, Mom wrote a letter to my supervisor thanking me for going above and beyond because she was battling post partum depression after giving birth to this child's baby brother. Mom was afraid that she would hurt her daughter. This little girl even learned how to talk while in the van because of the singalong songs I played.

I worked for two years at St. Francis adult day care. I was supporting families as they came to grips with needing more support for their family member. Once I was driving a blind woman past a cemetery. I don't know how she knew we were going past a cemetery, but suddenly she asked how the people got out of their graves. Taken by surprise, I said "Jesus." She pointed out that no one who got out of the grave had health problems, no walkers or wheelchairs. Again, I said "Jesus." She wanted to know more about Jesus. While I shared the

Good News with her, I said she could go live with Jesus, but she needed to let me get her home first. I told the family and the Chaplain at work about her decision for Christ. She died three days later. Several other participants who were in the van that day began to actively seek Jesus.

Now I work for First Student driving the big yellow school bus for a district that is largely diverse: blacks, whites, Asians, Muslims, Jehovah Witnesses, and Christians. There are huge economic differences within the district causing lots of arguments between the haves and have nots. The middle school and high school kids are trying to discover for themselves who they are apart from family influence. I had a 12 year-old boy remind me of God's grace when he was bullied by a girl for his Christian belief, and she stole his Bible to try to prove him wrong. She spent the rest of the ride reading the Bible trying to find something to use against him. The boy told me not to write her up because she needed grace. That boy had it right.

I have elementary school kids talking about family struggles. I may be a bus driver, but I can show Christ's love through my actions. A Christian mentor told me to remember that I am the only Bible some people will read, so I need to live it out with my actions. I don't have the strongest prayer routine, but before I leave my house I often pray "God use me," and I find that He does use me in ways I never expected.
